5 June - Butterfly Habitat Planting Day

Three PV Lions helped plant dozens of butterfly plants at Laurelwood Park in Camarillo. Lions Bob Larson, Tom DeBardas and Bob Taylor spent a few hours digging and planting half a dozen different plant varieties. The ground was like concrete and proved difficult with just shovels. Fortunately after a few plantings they showed up with an auger that even had difficulty. Nonetheless, half a dozen people managed to plant about 2/3's of the plants before noon. A paid construction crew plus a few other volunteers came in the afternoon to finish.











6 June 1944 - Normandy Invasion WW2

By 1944, over 2 million troops from over 12 countries were in Britain in preparation for the invasion. On D-Day, Allied forces consisted primarily of American, British and Canadian troops but also included Australian, Belgian, Czech, Dutch, French, Greek, New Zealand, Norwegian, Rhodesian and Polish naval, air or ground support.

6 June 1944 - was the largest amphibious invasion in the history of warfare. The statistics of D-Day, codenamed Operation Overlord, are staggering. The Allies used over 5,000 ships and landing craft to land more than 150,000 troops on five beaches in Normandy. The landings marked the start of a long and costly campaign in north-west Europe, which ultimately convinced the German high command that defeat was inevitable.

Early on 6 June, Allied airborne forces parachuted into drop zones across northern France. Ground troops then landed across five assault beaches - Utah, Omaha, Gold, Juno and Sword. By the end of the day, the Allies had established a foothold along the coast and could begin their advance into France.

D-Day required unprecedented cooperation between international armed forces. The Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force (SHAEF) was an international coalition and although the Allies were united against Germany, the military leadership responsible for 'Overlord' had to overcome political, cultural and personal tensions.

'Overlord' did not bring an end to the war in Europe, but it did begin the process through which victory was eventually achieved. By the end of August 1944, the German Army was in full retreat from France, but by September Allied momentum had slowed. The Germans were able to regroup and launched a failed but determined counter-offensive in the Ardennes in December 1944. This defeat sapped German manpower and resources and allowed the Allies to resume their advance towards Germany.



7 June - Food Share Drive-Thru

PV Lions DG Rich, BillS, BillC and BobT spent 3 hours at the drive-thru serving about 300 patrons. The veggie boxes and USDA bags in particular were very heavy this week so we got a workout handing them off.

It definitely was a banner week for food distribution because of the quality and quantity of food distributed.

Our bikes live in a town called Tours, France, so we have a month to see what we came to see and get the ponies back to the barn there.

Our bikes were stored at the top right on this map. We're now at a tiny village on the Mani Peninsula of the Peloponnese,



Ladyhawk, and Junior Biscuit after Sea Biscuit, the name of my other bike, same make and model, but older.

Back to the plan — we'd heard that Greece was too hot in the summer so we planned to come in June thinking it would be uncomfortable but not unbearable. We underestimated things. We'll head out of here without checking everything off our list.

A guy named Nicos trucked our bikes from Kastoria south to his storage place a couple hours from Athens. His wife, Georgia, picked us up at the airport and brought us to a hotel near the storage place, and the next morning

she drove us to the bikes, and we were on our way. The bikes hadn't been ridden for a year so we took them in to a dealer in Athens for service, booked a hotel for three days, and checked out the sights including the Acropolis, the Parthenon, the Acropolis Museum and the Museum of Cycladic Art. We rode the hop-on, hop-off bus around the city. Traffic was a nightmare. We feasted on

Greek salads daily and sweltered in the heat. (Sorry for complaining yet again.)

I'm writing from a delightful boutique hotel on the Mani Peninsula of the Peloponnese. It's not exactly cool here, but our hotel is on a hillside and gets a continuous breeze.



Shame & Humiliation

Maybe Greece doesn't like me because I managed to dump my bike again here. I was coming to a stop just before a onelane passage and was braking just a little harder than normal

to stop where I could see the light. My ABS system kicked in which told me that it was slippery (it had been drizzling, refreshing considering the heat), I came to a stop, put my feet down and my right foot just slid out and I dropped the bike. Damn! Nothing hurt except my pride.

June 10, 2024

People seem to be exceptionally nice and will go out of their way to be friendly and helpful. We chatted with the owner of a small gelateria, Steve, for a few minutes after Jeff ordered some scoops, and then he refused to take any money.

Traffic here is . . . well, crazy. It is assumed that motorcycles will go the head of any line and they can get there by squeezing between cars, going into opposing traffic (frowned upon but it happens pretty regularly), and ripping up the right side using the bus lane. In Athens, it was similar in terms of risk to life and limb to what we witnessed in Naples a few years back - except here there will be one, maybe two people on a bike, in Naples it could be the whole family of five. Most people here

be the whole family of five. Most people here are in shorts and t-shirts, and helmets are about 50/50. Tailgating is a national sport so I've taken to letting cars pass me rather than having them run up my tailpipe.

The Museum of the Acropolis is absolutely wonderful — And it's air conditioned! Therefore well attended. I'm not sure what drove their decisions as to where to place the interpretive signage. This display of coins certainly left room to place the sign somewhere other than at my ankles. I'm assuming somebody on the museum staff does this to amuse him/herself, probably stakes it out on breaks to watch the downward-facing dog pose of those who attempt to read it.

Here as in other European countries, people appeal to or thank various saints by putting up a shrine. There are hundreds of these along the roads, ranging from a simple box-on-a-pole design to the really ostentatious ones that have a little hut inside a small fenced area. Most have little glass doors, a picture of the saint, maybe a candle and a memento or two; some have flowers (usually fake), and the one in this picture had an engraved marble plaque at its base which, according to Google Translate, is in memory of various members of the Family Pelioura. (that's a lotta vowels!)





We often see robotic lawn mowers in Europe. They eagerly graze the lawn every morning. The Museum of the Acropolis apparently decided to go oldschool with their lawn maintenance and brought in a creep of tortoises. Just two in this picture, but we spotted about a half-dozen and I'm sure there were more. Perhaps the "Will work for food" ethic is appealing. Certainly it's more charming.

A Cycledic figure on display at the Museum of Cycledic Art in Athens. I've drawn inspiration from this genre in creating my own ertwork.


The Parthenon is truly impressive. How the heck did they build this so long ago? Scaffolding shows where there's active restoration work underway.



The Ride

We liked Greece — but we'd have liked it much better if it weren't so darn hot. It was so hot that they had to close the schools. And two days after we toured the Acropolis, they closed it due to heat. So we left. Maybe we'll come back again sometime. The last place we went was to the Mani Peninsula in the Peloponnese. I covered that in our last travelogue except for a boat tour of the Caves of Diros, pictures at the end of this travelogue. Then we had a two-day ride to get to a port city with a ferry to Brindisi, Italy, then a couple-

> day blast up the east coast there to get to the Dolomite Mountains (eastern Alps) and relief from the heat. One notable thing about the ride along the Adriatic is that in one 100-km stretch we passed through 30 tunnels, I counted, not a typo. The Italians don't often go around a hill or mountain, they just dig straight through it.

> When our ferry got to the port in Brindisi, Italy, it was late in the day so we'd booked a room overnight. Turned out that the G7 meetings were taking place just up the road and there was a ton of extra security in Brindisi. Italy had parked an entire cruise ship in the port to house a few thousand

security forces there, and every few minutes a cop car would pass down the street.


DG Rich Cervantes inducted the new officers and board. This was a fitting end to Rich's term as governor. Rich complimented the club as the best (or one of the

Lion (Mr. 60 year PV Lion) presented a waist pack to our new president. *It will hold lots of fishing lures.*















- 29 July American athlete Carl Lewis won his fourth consecutive Olympic gold medal in the long jump on this very day. He is an American former track and field athlete who won nine Olympic gold medals, one Olympic silver medal, and 10 World Championships medals, including eight gold.
