












8 July - Orange Picking at Lion Hillary's Orchard





Here is the entire crowd, minus the photographer, doing its best to sing the Star Spangled Banner. This was out first official visitation of the year.




27 July Annual Horseshoe Tournament in Carpinteria





29 July - Monarch Butterfly Habit Construction in Oxnard

Lion 2VP Bob Larson leads our Environment Global Cause and he is working with Lion Renata Hundley from Oxnard Lions to build a fence to cordon off a Monarch Butterfly habitat in Oxnard. PV Lions donated \$1000 to supplement the \$1000 grant from the CA Lions Foundation to construct the fence. Most of the fence materials were stored at our yard off Dawson. Lion Bob rented a post hole digger and dug all the holes before the group below showed up to place the posts and insert the concrete. There were only two PV Lions plus Bob's friend Robert Hamming plus Renata and a few Oxnard Lions. They



worked till about 1:30, it was too warm after that. They will finish up after the Fair.





Some monarch butterflies migrate 3,000 miles

No animal on Earth travels quite like the eastern monarch butterfly. Its jour-ney begins in the early days of spring on a few mountains in central Mexico. Millions of the monarchs (*Danaus plex-ippus plexippus*) fill the branches of oyamel firs, and as the temperature warms up, they soak in the sun and begin their epic journey northward — a 3,000-mile trip that looks more like a bird's migration than an insect's.



But it's not only the miles that make the butterfly's

journey so remarkable — it's also the means. A typical monarch butterfly lives for only about four weeks, not nearly long enough to complete the journey to the northern U.S. and Canada. So the migration becomes a multi-generational one. In a typical year, it will take four generations for Monarch butterflies to finish the seasonal quest their great-grandparents started.


Horoscope: Leo - Virgo

- Virgos use pointers and elaborate charts to describe philosophical concepts.


