

1 March - Visit to Oxnard Downtown

We completed our short-tail award by visiting Oxnard Downtown Lions. The four PV Lions at right made the trip to Oxnard in a storm (actually it was a light drizzle but just looking for a little sympathy) to complete the short tail.

Oxnard Pres. Jim Bickel welcomed us but left with sniffles. PDG Kalani Jose came a little later and gave us a rundown on the MD4 convention. He noted that there were no lions or clubs listed for awards from 4-A3. Clearly it was an error and they apologized but there was no recourse. 4-A3 had great



candidates for project of the year (Magic Yarn comes immediately to mind) and lions of the year, nonetheless an honest clerical error kept them off the ballot.



March 1, 1872, Yellowstone becomes America's first National Park.

<u>Yellowstone National Park</u>, an almost mystical 2.2-million acre wonderland of dynamic hydrothermal activity, breathtaking scenery and spectacular wildlife, was established on this day in history, March 1, 1872.

It was the first national park in <u>the United States</u> and, to most people around the world, the first known on the planet.

It quickly inspired an international conservation movement in the wake of the Industrial Revolution.

The headwaters of the Yellowstone River ... is hereby reserved and withdrawn from settlement, occupancy, or sale ... and dedicated and set apart as a public park or pleasuring-ground for the benefit and enjoyment of the people," states the Yellowstone National Park Protection Act, signed into law by President Ulysses S. Grant.

The park is located mostly in the northwestern corner <u>of Wyoming</u>, the least populated state in the Union, but also crosses into Montana and Idaho.

Its area of 3,472 square miles makes it bigger than Rhode Island and Delaware combined.

"Although Yellowstone had been thoroughly tracked by tribes and trappers, in the view of the nation at large it was really 'discovered' by a series of formal expeditions" between 1869 and 1871, reports the National Park Service.

David E. Folsom, Charles W. Cook and William Peterson explored the park in 1869 and reported on its spectacular physical features for media back east.

Tower Fall, Yellowstone Grand Canyon and the geysers of Firehole River were among the marvels they described for first time.

A new expedition in 1870 led by surveyor Henry D. Washburn recorded the size and scope of Yellowstone's greatest landmarks.



Lion Paul Hawblitzel Obituary

Camarillo: Paul Hawblitzel - Husband father and friend to many has passed away. He had a rich life including growing up in South Bend IN attending Norte Dame University and graduating from college in 1957 with a degree in accounting. Following graduation he had a 2 year stint in the US Army stationed in Japan as an intelligence specialist. His path led him to California and a brief stop in Malibu where he lived with several army and college friends. It is here that he met the love of his life Loretta (then Griffith) Hawblitzel. A romantic courtship followed by a wedding in Feb of 1962 - meaning a wonderful 62 years of marriage to Loretta. Paul was part of a



unique class of citizens in Camarillo, he and Loretta were Charter Residents in 1964. Paul worked at what was then the 3M Co, followed by a very successful career as a real estate broker and property manager. Paul was an avid golfer and spent many years coaching and organizing Boys Baseball in Camarillo. Paul is Survived by Loretta and 4 wonderful children Mark (Maggie), Lynn, Jay (Kristin) Mary. He especially enjoyed his grandchildren Conor, Ryan, Cody, Riley, Jack, Grif, Henry. Funeral Services will be held at St. Mary Magdalene Chapel on April 4th at 10am.

Our Dogs



March 13, 1942 On this day in history, , US Army K-9 Corps begins training dogs to fight in World War II

The U.S. Army K-9 Corps, which trained more than 10,000 dogs to serve several branches of the American military in World War II, began barking orders to its four-legged foot soldiers on this day in history, March 13, 1942.

"Dogs have been associated with the <u>United States Army</u> since its inception, but their role has been primarily that of a mascot or in some other unofficial capacity," Dr. Arthur W. Bergeron Jr. of the U.S. Army Military History Institute wrote in 2016.

He added, "Not until World War II did the Army make the connection official."

The American Kennel Club organized a civilian group called Dogs for Defense in January 1942, in the frantic weeks after the attack on <u>Pearl Harbor</u> that roused the righteous might of the American people — and American pups.

Lieutenant Colonel Clifford C. Smith of the Army Quartermaster Corps became aware of the <u>American Kennel Club</u> effort and ran the idea of the K-9 Corps up the flagpole with Major General Edmund B. Gregory. The unit won approval of Undersecretary of War Robert P. Patterson and began training dogs for the U.S. Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard, in addition to the Army.

"The K-9 Corps initially accepted over 30 breeds of dogs, but the list was soon narrowed to seven: German Shepherds, Belgian sheepdogs, Doberman Pinschers, collies, Siberian Huskies, Malumutes and Eskimo dogs," reports The U.S. Army Airborne & Special Operations Museum of Fayetteville, North Carolina.

18 March - Zone 6 Student Speaker Contest - 1/2

14 Mar - Easter Festival Setup 2/9

Seven Pleasant Valley and three Santa Paula Lions showed up to collect equipment from the yard and then set up at Underwoods. Due to the heavy rains last week the ground was plowed to help speed drying but it was difficult traversing the ground; at least it wasn't muddy. To minimize walking on the craggy ground we set up a supply chain to unload the multiple trucks. We spent about 3 hours total and then headed to lunch. There were some instances of very high gusts but we and the tent survived.













16 - 17 March - Easter Festival 3/9

The first weekend is complete and the weather was great, however we had significant startup problems that made day 1 very trying. It was like a Grimm fairy tale.

We hooked everything up to the generator and nothing worked. After a couple of hours fiddling with all the connections it was obvious that we needed a new generator. Underwoods provided two smaller generators so we rerouted all our connections and we were finally up and running a few hours later than expected.

Underwoods spent \$16K on a new corn cooker and this was the very first time it was used. Once we had power we noted that the new digital corn cooker was taking an hour to produce corn and it was charred. We lowered the temp and solved that problem. Fortunately day 1 is always a little slow but it definitely affected our early sales. We found the manual on the internet and it explicitly said that corn took 28 minutes, not one hour. There was no speed adjustment available—Uh Oh!. We called the manufacturer and fortunately talked to someone on a Saturday who was very knowledgeable (probably the owner) and he immediately said "we put the wrong motor on the unit".— Uh Oh again. Then he said "I'll mail a new motor on Monday". Even though we told him that we were not Underwoods he didn't care.

We managed on Sunday by starting the corn cooker at 0830 and hope to have the new motor later in the week. *Ed. Note: we got the motor and Underwoods installed it* — *Yea!!*



Day 1 is always the most difficult but thanks to Pleasant Valley, Santa Paula, Amber's Light and Conejo Valley Lions and Santa Paula Leos we survived.

All but one (Lloyd) in the tent are from Santa Paula.



16 - 17 March Easter Festival 4/9

Just when I thought it couldn't get any worse we got a call informing us that the canopy covering our computer equipment blew over and took the equipment with it. Lion Mike charged out to Underwoods to check the equipment and arrived just as a downpour occurred so he covered the equipment and he an Anthony headed to the trailer. Odds and Ends

• WHY do men's clothes have buttons on the right while women's clothes have buttons on the left?

BECAUSE: When buttons were invented, they were very expensive and worn primarily by the rich. Since most people are right-handed, it is easier to push buttons on the right through holes on the left. Because wealthy women were dressed by maids, dressmakers put the buttons on the maid's right! And that's where women's buttons have remained since.

• WHY do X's at the end of a letter signify kisses?

BECAUSE: In the Middle Ages, when many people were unable to read or write, documents were often signed using an X. Kissing the X represented an oath to fulfill obligations specified in the document. The X and the kiss eventually became synonymous.

• WHY is shifting responsibility to someone else called passing the buck'?

BECAUSE: In card games, it was once customary to pass an item, called a buck, from player to player to indicate whose turn it was to deal. If a player did not wish to assume the responsibility of dealing, he would 'pass the buck' to the next player.

• WHY do people clink their glasses before drinking a toast?

BECAUSE: In earlier times it used to be common for someone to try to kill an enemy by offering him a poisoned drink. To prove to a guest that a drink was safe, it became customary for a guest to pour a small amount of his drink into the glass of the host. Both men would drink it simultaneously. When a guest trusted his host, he would only touch or clink the host's glass with his own.

BIG CHEEKS

Bet you don't know "Big cheeks"

Big cheeks. A grandson of slaves, a boy was born in a poor neighborhood of New Orleans known as the "Back of Town." His father abandoned the family when the child was an infant. His mother became a prostitute and the boy and his sister had to live with their grandmother.

Early in life he proved to be gifted for music and with three other kids he sang in the streets of New Orleans. His first gains were coins that were thrown to them.

A Jewish family, Karnofsky, who had emigrated from Lithuania to the USA, had pity for the 7-year-old boy and brought him into their home. Initially giving 'work' in the house, to feed this hungry child. There he remained and slept in this Jewish family's home where, for the first time in his life, he was treated with kindness and tenderness.

When he went to bed, Mrs. Karnofsky sang him a Russian lullaby that he would sing with her. Later, he learned to sing and play several Russian and Jewish songs.

Over time, this boy became the adopted son of this family. The Karnofskys gave him money to buy his first musical instrument; as was the custom in the Jewish families.

They sincerely admired his musical talent. Later, when he became a professional musician and composer, he used these Jewish melodies in compositions, such as St. James Infirmary and Go Down Moses.

The little black boy grew up and wrote a book about this Jewish family who had adopted him in 1907. In memory of this family and until the end of his life, he wore a Star of David and said that in this family, he had learned "how to live real life and determination"

You might recognize his name. This little boy was called: Louis "Satchmo" Armstrong.

Louis Armstrong proudly spoke fluent Yiddish! And "Satchmo" is Yiddish for "Big Cheeks"!!!

Historical Dates in April

April 15, 1912

Four days into the ship's journey from Southampton, England, to New York City, the Titanic collided with an iceberg off the coast of Newfoundland on the night of **April 14, 1912**. The 882.5-foot-long ship disappeared beneath the ocean in the early hours of April 15, 1912, at about 2:20 a.m.



The Revolutionary War was a war unlike any other—one of ideas and ideals, that shaped "the course of human events." With 165 principal engagements from 1775-1783, the Revolutionary War was the catalyst for American independence.

April 24, 1800

The Library of Congress was established by Congress with an appropriation of five thousand dollars, as the government prepared to move from Philadelphia to the new capital city of Washington.

April 30, 1789

The first inauguration of George Washington as the first president of the United States was held on the balcony of Federal Hall in New York City, New York. The inauguration was held nearly two months after the beginning of the first four-year term of George Washington as president.
