



17 Jan—Santa Paula Lions 100th Anniversary 4/4


Joanna Taylor creates from memory, imagination, and emotion, crafting folk-inspired works that blend home, history, and the natural world. A self-taught artist working in painting, collage, textiles, and book arts, she builds her own “art supplies” by carving stamps, sewing, and gathering natural materials: soil, plant dyes, even water from lakes and rivers to create “earth notes” on paper and cloth. Her subjects include family, pets, places, wildlife, and memory, often stitched together through narrative, research, and reverie. In her words, “We are all a part of my art pieces... present, past, and future generations.” This selection -- spanning paintings, artist’s books, and her Sampler Series -- reveals “worlds within worlds,” where handmade details carry intimate meaning. The result is a body of work that preserves what matters: connection, wonder, and the spirit of place.

HOPE IS A SEARCH DOG WHO WILL NOT GIVE UP

For almost 30 years, the Search Dog Foundation has been dedicated to forging the most effective disaster search teams in the nation. Our mission is simple yet profound: to bring hope to the darkest moments of a disaster and to search until everyone is found.

We've seen the powerful impact of these teams time and time again, like that of the seven SDF-trained teams that deployed to Mexico City following the 7.1 magnitude earthquake in September 2017. Among the teams, search dog handler Fidel Gomez witnessed firsthand how distressed community members were buoyed by the arrival of the canine teams:

"When the community sees the dogs arriving to the devastated areas, it's hope for the community. The community feels they have all the support—yes, from the fire department that responds—but most importantly, from the dogs. The community immediately turns their attention to the dogs, because they understand that the dog is the hope of finding their relatives." This relentless commitment to search has defined our work, empowering hundreds of first responders and their canine partners to deploy to major disasters—from devastating earthquakes in Haiti, Mexico, and Turkey—to events closer to home, such as the California wildfires and catastrophic flooding in Texas and Washington state.


