We hope to collaborate with other local lions clubs to bring this program to Ventura County and to increase community awareness of Lions.

Lions Friends in Sight has 25-30 events a year with 300-500 served at each event. To date 90,000 have been served and 8,000 diagnosed with vision threatening disease. Eyeglasses are selected from a huge cache of glasses and new glasses are provided if a match cannot be made.

Santa Paula Lion Ken Aries shown below described their clubs participation in this program over the past few years. Several PV Lions helped at one event a couple of years ago and it was a great experience.

Our Mission

Restoring Vision – Preventing Blindness

At California Lions Friends in Sight we educate, restore vision, and prevent blindness for thousands of disadvantaged men, women and children. This work is made possible by caring volunteers donating their time, talent and treasure to deliver the “Gift of Sight”.

Affiliated with Lions Clubs International, California Lions Friends in Sight is an all-volunteer stand-alone 501c3 charitable organization headquartered in Beaumont, California. With financial support and the donation of eye examination equipment and supplies from generous donors, volunteers carry out the mission by providing free vision screenings and free recycled eyeglasses to thousands of disadvantaged individuals throughout Southern California and Northern Mexico.

Our Goals

Our primary goals are to educate the public on vision related matters, to address the functional forms of visual impairment by providing eyeglasses closely matched to a screening refraction, and to assess for ocular health conditions that could lead to visual impairment, including blindness. Individuals with a medical and/or surgical need diagnosed by a licensed optometrist or ophthalmologist are counseled and directed to seek care.

We conduct more than 30 doctor-led screenings each year in an area stretching east to west from Blythe to Oxnard, and south to San Diego. Five weekend-long screenings are conducted in Northern Mexico. Last fiscal year we screened 12,036 people, provided eyeglasses to 9,461, and advised more than 675 to seek medical or surgical care.

Still, more screenings are needed and we at California Lions Friends in Sight have an important role to play to provide them. We have an ongoing need to add new volunteers and to raise funds to achieve this goal.

Our Volunteers

Our events would not be possible without dedicated volunteers working before and after each screening. We collect, sort, clean, verify and categorize donated eyeglasses and operate our own optical edging lab. Other volunteers raise funds, produce public relations communications, maintain the vehicles and equipment, and organize eyeglasses and supplies needed for each screening.

- ⇒ *Student Speaker Contest:* Materials have been ordered. 1st VP Morgan will lead the effort with Lion Kim helping to locate speakers.
- ⇒ *Farmers Market:* 3 PV Lions will handle this event on Saturday 21 August. It conflicts with the 1st District Zoom meeting so it will be a busy day for PV Lions.
- ⇒ *State of The City:* \$55.00 per ticket: We expect to have one or two members attend this event sponsored the chamber of commerce.
- ⇒ *Barbeque for Wings over Camarillo on Friday 20 August.:* This was a last minute deal brokered by Pres. Bruce and organized by PP Mike to serve 300 burgers and hot dogs, beans, and potato salad at \$8/person to 300 family, friends, organizers, and helpers for this annual event.
- ⇒ *Ride on Lions Club Rose Bowl Float:* The board approved a \$20 donation to buy tickets that will be raffled off to the club.

Victory Over Japan Day: End of WWII

V-J Day, or Victory over Japan Day, marks the end of World War II, one of the deadliest and most destructive wars in history. When President Harry S. Truman announced on Aug. 14, 1945, that Japan had surrendered unconditionally, war-weary citizens around the world erupted in celebration.

On August 14, 1945, it was announced that Japan had surrendered unconditionally to the Allies, effectively ending World War II. Since then, both August 14 and August 15 have been known as “Victory over Japan Day,” or simply “V-J Day.” The term has also been used for September 2, 1945, when Japan’s formal surrender took place aboard the U.S.S. Missouri, anchored in Tokyo Bay. Coming several months after the surrender of Nazi Germany, Japan’s capitulation in the Pacific brought six years of hostilities to a final and highly anticipated close.

Did you know? Rhode Island (*home state of the “Bulletin”*) is the only state with a holiday dedicated to V-J Day (its official name is Victory Day); it is celebrated on the second Monday in August. V-J Day parades are held in several other locations across the United States, including Seymour, Indiana; Moosup, Connecticut; and Arma, Kansas.



20 August ... Wings over Camarillo Air Show ... Barbeque 1/3

Pres. Bruce was contacted on Monday 16 Aug to see if we might be able to cook 300 each Lion burgers and hotdogs plus beans and potato salad for 300 participants from Wings over Camarillo. The catch was that the barbeque was on Friday 20 August. It wasn't confirmed until late Tuesday so PV had to scramble. Pres. Bruce wouldn't be available so he enlisted 2xPP Mike to make it happen; however, before Bruce left town he filled containers of potato salad. The deal was \$8/guest so we got a check for \$2400 resulting a net profit of about \$1700 so it was a profitable event.

Nine PV Lions did the barbeque with Pres. Bruce's help up front of course. Lions included PP's Nunez, Price, Mansfield and Taylor, Christie, Flores, Schulze, Stayton and Martinez.

We had 150 each burgers and dogs ready at 5:30 per request but didn't really start getting guests till well after 6pm so we did our best to keep the food warm but many folks commented that they appreciated the food so it all worked out. Turned out that we only had an estimated 125 total guests but we still got paid for the 300. We left all the cooked food for them at 7:30 pm when we closed up shop; ***we must have done a good job because they want us back next year.*** The folks in orange are the "pyro group" mentioned on the next page. They are lucky we served them after the "bomb" they set off making us think that we were under attack.

The F18, top corner below right seems to be waving its wings at our Lions Flag and we appreciated the gesture.




20 August ... Wings over Camarillo Air Show ... Barbeque 2/3

While prepping for the barbeque we had quite a treat because the pilots were practicing. If you were anywhere in Camarillo you probably heard a loud boom at about 4:30 pm. Lion John Fraser told me that he heard it at city hall and thought there was a plane crash so you can imagine what we heard 60 yards from the blast shown below. We never saw it coming and it shocked us all (a few had to change their shorts and check their pacemaker). The blast was set off by the “pyro group” as part of a bombing run shown top left. Shortly after the blast we were visited by an F18 who made many circles around Camarillo and I know you heard it particularly when it engaged its afterburners, which it did every time it came over the runway. The Vietnam era medivac helo had a very useful purpose. Typically there was long line of customers to the helo to refill their red cups from the keg of Modelo on board.





District 4A3 Meeting and Installation of Officers




With a network of more than 700 chapters and 149,000 members across the United States and Canada, Quail Forever and Pheasants Forever are able to accomplish thousands of wildlife habitat projects annually.



Go to: Quailforever.org to learn more about them. As you can see from their site the organization is huge and it has affected a very large habitat area across the US and parts of Canada.

Two factors affect quail populations above all others—habitat and weather. While we can't control the weather, we can influence the quality and quantity of upland habitat. Habitat is what supports long-term strong and healthy quail populations.

Since forming in 1982, Pheasants Forever, and its subsequent quail division, Quail Forever (formed in 2005) has created or enhanced wildlife habitat on more than 15.8 million acres across the United States and parts of Canada. Here's how Quail Forever and Pheasants Forever accomplishes this work.


I'm just going to give you a vicarious taste of the trip with a few photos.

The Plan

We've allotted only three weeks for this trip and we've decided to pack in a lot of adventure because we didn't get here to Europe at all last year and weren't sure we should go sitting in the garage in Tours, France, for a second year. We'd hoped to ride Southern Spain because we've not been there on the bikes, but after hearing about the record-setting heat in that area (117°F), we decided to stay farther north, at higher elevations and / or near the Atlantic Ocean. Decision made: Pyrénées

Mountains, Picos de Europa Mountains and the northwest coastal areas of Spain. We've ridden the Pyrénées and Picos before (absolutely wonderful) so weren't at all disappointed.



I can't help but like how the old buildings tell the story of their changing uses over the years. Note how the stonework round the front door in the photo on the left is different from elsewhere on this building, how the stone of the arches over the doors isn't the same. I also find it attractive how stones are set into the walls in this region. In the picture below, you can see some exposed brick under the windows, again it shows how centuries-old buildings have been repurposed.

Overall the riding here is about as good as it gets, curvy mountain roads, cool weather (a lot of fog near the coast) in the mornings, warm afternoons, mild evenings, no rain.





Last week I asked you to complete a short survey about Medicare and the proposed expansion of benefits, including sight and hearing benefits.


I am updating you on the initial results of our survey; we'll keep you posted on this critical issue.
