


7 Dec 1941 — Air Raid On Pearl Harbor

On **December 7**, 1941, Japanese planes attacked the United States Naval Base at <u>Pearl</u> <u>Harbor*External*</u>, Hawaii Territory, killing more than 2,300 Americans. The <u>U.S.S. Ari-</u> <u>zona</u> was completely destroyed and the U.S.S. Oklahoma capsized. A total of twelve ships sank or were beached in the attack and nine additional vessels were damaged.

More than 160 aircraft were destroyed and more than 150 others damaged.

A hurried dispatch from the ranking United States naval officer in Pearl Harbor, Admiral Husband Edward Kimmel, Commander in Chief of the United States Pacific Fleet, to all major navy commands and fleet units provided the first official word of the attack at the ill-prepared Pearl Harbor base. It said simply: AIR RAID ON PEARL HAR-BOR X THIS IS NOT DRILL.


9 Dec Christmas "Parade"



We had a very nice haul of eye glasses and batteries, supplemented by those from the Market office who collected many of these items during the month.


Lion John showed up to collect the glasses as we were closing for the day.




19 Dec — On this day in history, December 19, 1843, Charles Dickens publishes 'A Christmas Carol'



Update from the Hawaii Lions Foundation on donations from California Lions Foundation!

Thank you to one and all for your donations to California Lions Foundation or directly to the Hawaii Lions Foundation to help those affected by the horrific fires in Maui last August!!!



Below is an update from PDG Mark Mizuno on how the Hawaii Lions Foundation is spending the funds California Lions and others helped raise for the Lahaina Fire Relief effort. The way the Hawaii Lions Foundation works, the spending of the disaster funds is directed by the District Governor. District Governor Chris Kalapodes has an advisory board of PDG Joe Pontailla, PDG Mark Mizuno, and PDG Angie Harimoto, all from Maui, as well as Lion Lisa Puua, the past president of the Lahaina Branch Club, and Zone Chair Lion Paul Seto whose zone includes the two Maui clubs.

The Maui Lions chose to put most of their efforts into the third and fourth phases of the recovery when many of the other groups and individual have left. The Hawaii Lions Foundation tried to fill holes and needs in the early efforts. Now we are helping to feed people and work in the recovery phase.

It has been 4 months since the beginning of the Maui wildfires that devastated Lahaina and Upcountry Maui. The first phase of disaster recovery by the Lions Clubs of Maui was to form a Disaster Response Team in the first week and connect with all organizations that were responding and receiving advice from the Paradise Lions Club that dealt with its own wildfire disaster 5 years ago.

The Red Cross was the first to respond and set up shelters throughout the island. The Salvation Army took on the task of taking care of the already homeless population. The National Guard stepped in to provide security and FEMA had the unenviable task of victim identification. We took on the task of filling gap needs such as replacing eyeglasses and hearing aids, providing coolers to transport meals, purchasing filter masks, working in the shelters, preparing, and boxing meals, and making sure that our first responders were recognized for their heroic work. The first phase included housing all those displaced into vacant hotels, extended family homes, and vacation rentals.

The second phase of disaster recovery was to provide food security. For the next two months the culinary arts program at UH Maui College prepped, cooked, and sent out for delivery over 200,000 meals. This project was supported by Common Ground Collective, the UH Foundation, and the Lions Clubs of Maui. They were joined in by displaced restaurateurs, food truck owners and unaffected restaurants to produce thousands more meals. Planning was begun for long term housing, and the Lions offered to partner with work underway in Kahului to create a family village and give hope to survivors of the deadly and devastating wildfires.

We contacted Family Life Center Chief Executive Officer Maude Cumming to see how we could help. Cumming said 160 single-family shelters "with a homelike feel" will be constructed to create Ohana Hope Village off Kuihelani and Maui Veteran's Highways and once constructed the Lions could help to furnish the units. Those units will first go to multigenerational families, then to families with children. Two popup units will double up to fit up to a family of four.

With most people now housed in some way, the need for prepared meals has decreased and we have pivoted away from food preparation and moved to help purchase fresh produce. We then partner with community volunteers to pack and distribute 400 boxes of mostly local produce at the UH Maui College and the Maui Gold Pineapple Packing Facility. This not only helps those in need, but it helps our local farmers as well as gives the community an opportunity to help. We also provide meal subsidies to all Lahaina students attending the UH Maui College.

Our latest project is to partner with Binhi At Ani Filipino Community Center to provide direct assistance to those affected by the Lahaina wildfires. The Filipino Community Association provides hot meals, the Maui Food Bank provides boxes of produce, and the Lions Clubs of Maui provide gift cards to Island Grocery, a locally owned store that just reopened in Lahaina.

At the last distribution, we were able to meet with the US Army Corps of Engineers team that described their work to do: pre-debris removal assessment including cultural surveys, work with the EPA to remove debris in large selfcontained units, prepare a barrier lined dump site, and only leave after local officials certify cleanup is complete and ready to rebuild.

There is no charge to anyone affected by the wildfires and there are no citizenship checks. The distribution center is at the Napili Shopping Center which means that we have to drive through devastated areas of Lahaina and it brings tears to our eyes and furthers our resolve to serve our community for the long term.





Who: Volunteers must be 18 years or older and have the ability to walk distances in designated locations. You may select preferred city locations when you register.





They earned about six pence a week using a pea shooter to shoot dried peas at the windows of sleeping workers in East London, 1930s. She would not leave a window until she was sure that the workers had woken up. HIPSTORVALLOW



in 1922, at the University of Toronto, scientists went to a hospital ward with children who were comatose and dying from diabetic keto-acidosis. The scientists went from bed to bed and injected the children with the new purified extract - insulin. As they began to inject the last comatose child, the first child injected began to awaken.
