It was a busy month highlighted by the nomination and election of our own PP Rich Cervantes to the position of 1st Vice District Governor of MD4 – 4A3. We congratulate Lion Rich and know that he will do great.

Immediately after a celebration of Memorial Day I included the invitation from the ACORN to PP Lion Tom Blattel's *Celebration of Life* to be held at the Freedom Center on June 18. This would have occurred a long time ago but it was delayed due to Covid-19. We hope that lots of lions in Red can attend to celebrate PP Tom's long service to Lions.

There are invitations to PV Lions, Amber's Light Lions and to District 4A3 installations included herein. It is important that you respond to 1st VP Victor as soon as possible so we can finalize catering needs for the PV Installation. Next year's theme will be: Service and Membership (growth).

We had 11 PV Lions attend the District Convention in Santa Maria and know that we will be in good hands with our new District Governor Kalani Jose and 1st and 2nd DG incumbents. We did learn something of importance at the convention: don't let our 1st Vice DG get anywhere near a Karaoke machine—please! Our IPP Bruce was one of only three presidents to receive 100% President Awards, Congratulations Lion Bruce.

May was a busy lion burger barbeque month. First up was a barbeque for 47 Red Cross volunteers at a training session. Lion Dick is a long time Red Cross volunteer and asked for our help and we were happy to oblige. Next up was a barbeque for 458 members and family of the COSMOS track club at Camarillo Springs Park. We've done this several times before and it keeps growing. PP Bruce organized the event and had great support from 10 PV Lions. The club made over \$3500 from the event so it was a profitable day at the park. Next up was a barbeque for PVSEA school organized by PP Russ. This was a no cost (to PV) barbeque to support school activities. Eight PV Lions plus Amber's Light Mary Joe cooked for the 450 paying customers. Both barbeques served during a 1 1/2—2 hour period so we had to be well organized and we were.

Finally, 1st VP Victor and PP George participated in the NAMI Walk on the Beach to raise funds for mental health. Over 300 lions and friends "walked the walk".

THOMAS 'TOM' BLATTEL


December 22, 1937 — January 13, 2021

The Area 3 contest was held at the Camarillo Boys and Girls Club, and as you can see at bottom left it was very well attended. Seven PV Lions showed up to listen and to help as timer and door guard. The topic was *“how can kindness reunite our country”*.

The 4 speakers were exceptional and all were prior winners of \$4500 from their district contests plus several hundred more from club, zone and region contests. The Area 3 contest winner was **Ally Song** from 4L3 and she took home an additional \$6500; next up is the state contest and she should do well. Ally had to be good to beat 4A3 winner Lilly Flapper. 10 May - Regular Meeting 3/3





passed on to Oxnard clubs for consideration. This is large number of submissions compared to prior years and Lion Richard gave credit to Lion Kim Stephenson for supporting this effort.


The convention started with a flag salute led by Boy Scouts from Orcutt.

We were fortunate to have Past International Director Lion Robert “Bob” Block from MD1 Illinois as an honored guest and keynote speaker. We were also honored to have PID Howard Hudson plus many past district governors attend. Total attendance was about 74 lions.



The “smiling” lions at the immediate right were the first lions we met when all delegates got registered and certified.

Lion Lloyd gave the election report and the final tally for each candidate. Doctor Kalani was 55 - 0, a landslide while both 1st and 2nd Vice candidates were a little less than unanimous. Turns out that our registration lions above



were the only two lions that did not vote for Lion Rich for 1st Vice DG so the final vote tally for Rich was still a landslide at 53-2; **they were just trying to keep Rich humble.** Seems like our tail twister (the other one) may want to consider this at our next meeting. The final event of Saturday was a raffle of half the donated gifts. The raffle finished on Sunday.

While many clubs were represented I had to include two of our Santa Paula friends, Glenda and Al Learn.




Awards

We had 13 board members in attendance; Pres. Mike is shielded by PP John and PP Chet was almost there.

- Membership: Lion Mike is working on establishing a committee of 5 with some younger and some seasoned/older members to develop new strategies for membership growth. Everyone is enthusiastic about pursuing membership growth so we are totally supportive of this initiative.
- Global Service Chair: Lion Bill Schulze noted that we have achieved 4100 service hours for the year to date.
- Scholarship Committee: PP Richard Baker informed us that the committee had selected 3 winners and all were from Camarillo High. The board approved amount was originally \$4000, after some discussion of amount an increase of \$2500 to the preapproved amount was approved for a total of \$6500. This will allow awards of \$3000, \$2000 and \$1500 for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place finishers. These awards will be given at our first meeting in June at the O Club and family members will be invited. This is the start of a new tradition and it will allow the club to see how its money is being spent on local youth and allow the winners to get special recognition.
- Installation Dinner: The installation date was moved to the last Tuesday of the month to allow a little more time to prepare. PDG Cassey will install the new board. Dinner will be catered and it will be held at the O Club.

24 May - Regular Meeting 1/3







26 May - Barbeque for PVSEA School





Join Me in Supporting the International Dues Adjustment Resolution

Dear Convention Delegate,

Our association has persevered for more than a century, and we have been there to support our communities throughout every challenge the world has faced along the way. That's why it is critical we take steps to make sure we'll always be there, ready to serve, when the world needs us.

In recent years, it has become clear that our current international dues are not sufficient to meet the rising costs of operations. **Lions Clubs International has not raised our international dues in 10 years** despite rising costs, which has created a challenging financial future for the association. We are currently operating in a budget deficit, and it will continue to increase as inflation and the cost of doing business increases.

To help ensure that we're able to meet the rising costs of doing business and the ongoing needs of our incredible Lions, the International Board of Directors proposed an international dues adjustment. It's a modest increase, but such an important one. The resolution would gradually adjust our current international dues of \$43 by \$7 over a three-year period:

- **\$3 increase on July 1, 2023**
- **\$2 increase on July 1, 2024**
- **\$2 increase on July 1, 2025**

Even with this modest increase, **our dues would still be significantly lower than the dues of Rotary and Kiwanis today.**



- The decision of the Non-Profit Space Manager shall be final.


