Lion Dick Bellman chaired our Student Speaker Contest this year and we had three terrific speakers from Oxnard Middle College, Camarillo H.S. and Westlake H.S. speak on the topic: "**Social Media - Does it Unite us or Separate us**". 6 Jan - Ribbon Cutting - Vision Equip for Las Islas Clinic in Oxnard

Ventura County welcomed International Lions Club President, Brian Sheehan and his First Lady Lori Sheehan alongside Lions Clubs of Ventura County for a virtual Ribbon Cutting of the Phase 1 of Lions Club International Foundation Matching Grant funds totaling \$200K. These funds purchased vital vision equipment for a federally qualified health care clinic, Las Islas in South Oxnard and other retinal cameras for a few more locations. Our local Lions Club members are Knights of the Blind and have been champions for our community carrying the Lions mission. County of Ventura's Executive Officer, Board of Supervisors, County Department and Agency Leaders, Health Care Agency leaders, doctors, nurses and staff as well as Health Care Foundation Board of Directors and Advisory Board Members welcome and thank all the Lions for their community partnership.



Several Pleasant Valley Lions attended the event including 1stVDG Rich Cervantes, George Graham, Tom Debaradas and Bill Schulze who is the 4A3 district liaison to California Lions Friends in Sight.



7 Jan - Childhood Cancer Project (Magic Yarn)

Ambers Light planned a Magic Yarn project prior to Ventura Downtown's 100th Birthday Celebration to enable Lions Club International President Brian Sheehan and First Lady Lori to participate. What a great way to show off this terrific project to our international community of Lions and to demonstrate this projects impact one of the 5 Global Causes - Childhood Cancer. *"Since 2015 over 44,000 wigs have been donated. Handmade and donated crocheted beanies which are then styled to resemble a variety of princesses, pirates, superheroes, and other beloved characters. They are made with soft acrylic yarns and embellished with gems, ribbon, silk flowers, and crocheted flowers, starfish and snowflakes. And the wigs are machine washable when placed in a mesh laundry bag."*

There is also an eyeglass collection box in his car, but that’s all that remains after over 8000 pairs were delivered to Friends in Sight.







17 Feb - Board Meeting

We had a long and well attended board meeting. The reason for its length was because we had three guest speakers. This page will focus on those speakers.





21 Jan - Farmers Market



The day started out cold and we were all bundled up, however by 10am it warmed and the market started to come alive.

Getting mucho rain...and it's certainly a blessing for our area.




My senior class photo at right...think I was 25. Still have that suit!





Lion Portal. The new Lion Portal will be combining *MyLion*, *MyLCI*, and *Insights*, along with some additional tools and functionality.

LCI is requesting that all Club Secretaries and/or Club Administrators review and update their club members' contact information in the MyLCI portal with a unique and correct email address for **each** member. **It has to be an email that is not shared with anyone else.** Note: Phone numbers will no longer be supported as a log in credential.

Club members please assist your club secretaries by providing your correct email address to update in MyLCI. Many of you use your corporate or work emails to receive Lions information. Ideally, it is recommended you establish a separate email address for receipt of Lions information.

It is estimated that the new Lion Portal will launch sometime in July 2023. We encourage that all contact information be verified and updated as soon as possible.

Please be on the look for email messages from LCI pertaining to the new Lion Portal. It is important you follow the instructions that will be provided by LCI technology staff.

- Once the page opens, click on "Service Activities" and then "Service Activities Drill Down"
- Near the top, choose your months and year (for example you can choose from July 2022 to December 2022 or just December to December).
- Moving across that same line, select "Lion" as Club Type, "Good Standing" as Current Status, and then "View Report"
- When the report comes up, ignore the part that says "As of [date you are doing it]" - the figures are for the month(s) you chose.
- When looking at the report that was generated, scroll down to "U.S. Affiliates, Bermuda and Bahamas" and click on the small to open the list.

- Scroll down to "Multiple District 4" and click on the to open and see all the districts in MD4.
- Now find "District 4 A3" and click on the to open and see all the clubs in our district!
- From there, it is pretty obvious as to the information provided to analyze.

Use of the Dashboard allows you to see if there are gaps in the 5 areas of focus: Hunger, Vision, Environment, Childhood Cancer, and Diabetes. Also, "All Other" is a category that lumps in all the items reported that are not in the primary five. If you know, as many do, that your club has performed activities, such as being part of the Magic Wig project, that fall under **Childhood Cancer**, PLEASE report them!! If you take part in a project organized by another club, you can still report the total number of your club's Lions, family members, etc. that participated and their hours.

Additionally, be sure to report trash pickup, recycling, and tree planting projects that your club undertakes as part of Lions Clubs International goal to help the **Environment**. Donations to other groups that assist with the environment also count.

Thank you to the 14 clubs who reported their "Happy Holidays" project to assist First Responders, the Military, and Veterans to me. Some are not yet reflected in *MyLion*, but we can still correct that. It was thrilling to see this response for the first time of pursuing this sort of project statewide.


